
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The Mole Hill Living Heritage Society

he Mole Hill Living Heritage Society was formed in the Summer of 1994 and officially incorporated the following November. After the city of Vancouver had begun to make it's intentions for the block — then known as Nelson Park — public in the early Spring, a few residents began to organize. After signing up most of the residents on the block it was decided that incorporation would give more credibility to the fledgling organization.

Very early on it was decided that our strategy would not be to just oppose, nor to defend the status quo. We had to come up with a vision for the block and a realistic means of achieving that vision. The core was Living Heritage: people, their community and the buildings they lived in intertwined with their histories.

The Society formed the friends of Mole Hill, an unprecedented citywide coalition of neighbourhood, church, union, service and advocacy organizations. Through their combined hard work the support of over six thousand Vancouver residents from communities throughout the city were enlisted to assist in the recognition, preservation and grassroots enhancement of this valuable housing resource and important piece of Vancouver's heritage. In 1996 the Society was awarded a City of Vancouver Heritage Award for their advocacy on behalf of Mole Hill.

Faculty Club hangs in for another round

Several years ago the former UBC Faculty Club seemed terminal. The bunkerlike building sat forlorn and neglected, empty after the financial failure of the club in the mid-1990s and tentatively set for replacement by a hotel tower. Greenish algae, dead leaves and rusty lawnchairs choked the pools of its Arthur Erickson-designed garden. The university has since relented on the hotel plans and spruced up the club for wedding receptions and other events, although most rooms are filled with cardboard boxes rather than martinitoting professors.

Designed in 1959 by the Swissborn Fred Lasserre, then director of UBC's architecture department, the Faculty Club is a rather stolid-looking building. Its visual heaviness and

rigidly rectangular shapes are partly relieved on the front by rough green stone spandrels and a butterfly-roofed porte-cochere, while the rear is lightened by glass window-walls opening onto decks and terraces.

In 1968 Arthur Erickson completed a roof-decked glass pavilion along the west side of the site and a lowslung guest accommodation wing to the east. More significantly, the design included a lovely garden courtyard framing a stunning view up Howe Sound. Enclosed by concrete and cedar post-and-beam trellises and lush native plantings, the garden includes large reflecting pools fed by cascading waterfall platforms. Rough aggregate terraces contrast the smoothness of water and glass. The effect on a sunny summer day is like a closed world of greenery, sky and ocean, as quiet and remote as the proverbial ivory tower.

Today, the Society is engaged in the redevelopment of Mole Hill according to the Mole Hill Vision — intact heritage housing and streetscapes, original community and creative public open spaces. This vision is a result of the input of all the individuals and organizations we have worked with over the years. The Society has formed a sister organization, the Mole Hill Commun-ity Housing Society, to oversee and manage this development.

Concurrently, the Mole Hill Living Heritage Society is engaged in the Mole Hill Neighbourhood Revitalization Project, sponsored by the Vancouver Foundation, the Co-operators Group and VanCity Community Foundation. The goals of this project are to assess services and needs in the West End and Downtown South as well as taking the pulse of existing organizations and individuals to see what issues are important. Will these be housing, heritage, social and development issues? The answers will determine the future directions of the Mole Hill Living Heritage Society.

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HV attends Round Table on Historic Preservation in Seattle

n Saturday June 10, a group of HV directors travelled to Seattle to attend a Round Table on Historic Preservation hosted by Historic Seattle, our sister society south of the border. The event was held at Town Hall, a former Presbyterian church now used as a public meeting venue. The focus of the event was a panel of representatives from heritage advocacy groups from major cities across the US, including New York, Baltimore, Miami, Denver, Oakland and LA, as well as a representative of the National Trust for Historic Preserva-tion. We learned that many of our counterparts are struggling with similar issues, such as finding new uses for old buildings, responding to develop-ment pressures, and addressing the economics of rehabilitation and re-use. Many jurisdictions benefit significantly from tax incentives for heritage preservation, heritage-friendly building codes, and enlightened funding programs that match social housing with the adaptive re-use of heritage properties. The preservation advocates also described successful fund-raising activities that have helped support their advocacy work. In all, an informative afternoon, and a great opportunity to rub shoulders with others who share our passion. Poor Prospects for Prospect Point Bridge

or some months, members of the heritage community and VHC have been working feverishly to try to save the Prospect Point Bridge. This 1938 arched structure that spans the Causeway just south of the Lion's Gate Bridge is scheduled for demolition and replacement as part of the Causeway widening project. With the help of a structural engineer, they brought the BCTFA to the table to discuss various retention options, which included lowering the roadway or raising the bridge, and tunneling through the solid sides of the bridge for pedestrians and cyclists. Unresolved issues might have been worked out if detailed design information was made available.

Unfortunately, the BCTFA has displayed an obstinate reluctance to seriously consider any retention options. The comparative costs have not been freshly calculated and do not consider demolition costs, and the number of trees that would be affected has likely been over-estimated by a factor of five. Faced with a lack of information and cooperation, the VHC passed a resolution at its July 24 meeting agreeing to pursue the issue no longer. Thank you John Ivison, James Burton, Hal Kalman, and Don Luxton for trying to save this highly visible if modest Vancouver landmark.

City Hall Setting a Good Example

The wood windows at City Hall are undergoing a renewal process which has recently been put back on track. At first, the paint colour was inappropriate and all of the sashes were being replaced no matter their condition. There was not even a Heritage Alteration Permit in place! But City staff have agreed to a darker colour that is more in keeping with the original design intent, will only selectively replace remaining original sashes if damaged beyond repair, and are applying for an HAP.

There are also plans to restore the lighting scheme for the exterior of the building using archival photos and recent stone patches will be re-tinted to improve their appearance.
